Secretary: 2-year term



John H. Cain, MSPAS, PA-C

Hello! My name is John Cain, and I am seeking your vote for Secretary of the North Carolina Academy of Physician Assistants (NCAPA).

I am a physician assistant at the Diabetes and Endocrinology Center of Wake Forest Baptist Health in Winston-Salem. Through my work, I treat patients with both Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes and other endocrine disorders while also serving as preceptor for Wake Forest PA students and podiatry fellows during their endocrinology clerkships. In addition, I am the current President of the Piedmont Association of Physician Assistants (PAPA), the NCAPA Regional Chapter serving the Piedmont Triad.

A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Centre College, I received my graduate education in public health and physician assistant studies at the University of Kentucky. In 2010, I began my career as a PA in family medicine at a federally-qualified community health center (FQHC) in rural Appalachia. There I found my niche in diabetes care as part of a HRSA-supportive collaborative between our FQHC and in-house 340b pharmacy. When my supervising physician left the practice after my first 12 months in practice, I fell victim to a Kentucky law at the time that required 18 months of direct supervision for new PAs. I was able to transition from the rural clinic to an urban diabetes center thanks to the success of the collaborative, but my practice was hindered by other state laws affecting Kentucky's PAs including the still-present lack of prescriptive authority for controlled substances and the now modified 100% co-signature requirement.

Frustrated by the regulatory environment for PAs in Kentucky and disheartened following visits with key state legislators, I decided to look for employment opportunities in more PA friendly states. This led to me relocating from the Bluegrass State to North Carolina in late 2014. Because of my prior experiences, I made a commitment moving forward to be an active voice for my profession and sought opportunities to become involved with the professional organizations who best serve the interests of PAs.

Besides being a fellow member of the American Academy of Physician Assistants, I have been actively involved locally with PAPA since moving to Winston-Salem first as a member, then Treasurer, and now in my second term as President. It has been an honor to lead PAPA, and thanks to the collective efforts of our PAPA Board of Directors and members we have continued to meet the educational needs of PAs in the Piedmont Triad with twice monthly educational offerings. We have continued to host a robust fall CME seminar annually and implement *PAPA Fights Hunger*, a community service initiative launched in October 2017 in partnership with our local food bank to celebrate our profession's 50th Anniversary. Through *PAPA Fights Hunger*, which will continue this October, PAPA members host food drives during PA Week to combat food insecurity in Northwest North Carolina. My leadership role with PAPA has also afforded me the opportunity to serve on the NCAPA Regional Chapters Committee, allowing me to work closely with fellow regional chapter leaders to share ideas and best practices while supporting each other's efforts. It is that spirit of working together to support and advocate for our profession in North Carolina and beyond that I will continue if elected NCAPA Secretary.
